Quick Summary

Private Joseph Stone



On August 22nd, 1883 in Dyersburg, Tennessee, Joseph Stone was born. Throughout his life he was an active and practising member of the Methodist Church. Stone was orphaned and single, when he decided to join the military. On January 1st, 1917 in the city of Windsor, Stone enlisted in the army in the Number 2 Battalion. He was given the title of Private and his occupation was listed as laborer. At the ripe age of 29, he was deemed medically fit to join the military. Private Stone was 133 pounds and was 5 feet and 8 inches tall with brown eyes, black hair, and a dark complexion. Furthermore, his medical report determined that he had decent chest capacity with a chest expansion of 3.2inches in circumference. Identifying features of Private Stone included he had a mole over his right hypochondrium and a scar on his left knee which was a result from a childhood injury. Upon intake, it is important to establish identifying features of soldiers. This is because it allows easy identification in the event of casualties. Throughout his service, Private Stone did get admitted to the hospital. On June 2nd, 1918, he was admitted to Manor War Hospital Epsom and remained there for 9 days. He was given a diagnosis of a complication with the structure of his urethra.
