





Brantford, May 25.—Nursing Sister Katherine Macdonald, who went to France a few months ago, was killed in the German air raids on British hospitals last Sunday, according to word from Ottawa to her mother, Mrs. M. Macdonald. No other details have been received. Miss Macdonald graduated from Victoria Hospital, London, and after going overseas, was attached for some time to a hospital in London.



military. Such a stride for
equality was enabled under
the War Time Elections Act.

- Katherine wrote many letters to her mother, father and finance, to explain her experiences as a Nursing Sister.
- Her letters were very short, unfinished, or unsigned, and she did not use the same style of writing that she did while she was travelling.
- And they told personal stories to depict her character and values.

 Katherine told stories about a connection she made with a man who could not fall asleep unless he held her hand.





 She would tell her family how she would take the time to pray at the graves of the fallen soldiers with some of her fellow Nursing Sisters.
